Ukrainian pianist **Alexey Botvinov** plays nocturnes, waltzes and a ballad by Frederic Chopin.

Maryna Lytvyniuk reads poems by Selma Meerbaum, one of Bukovina's great poets. She died in 1942 at the age of 18 after her deportation to the forced labor camp Mikhailovka, exhausted by typhus.

Pianist Alexey Botvinov is considered one of the best interpreters of Rachmaninov's works in the world. He has a reputation as an innovator in the field of classical music. Botvinov is a pioneer of numerous unique projects, especially those that unite different forms of art genres.

In 2015, Alexey Botvinov founded the music festival "ODESSA CLASSICS", which revitalized the almost forgotten musical tradition of Odesa. He is the president and artistic director of the festival. Under his guidance, the festival has become the leading festival for classical music in Ukraine.

The Bremen RathsChor has come to Chernivtsi to perform the "Elijah Oratorio" by the German composer of Jewish origin Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy together with musicians of the Chernivtsi Philharmonic and students of the Odesa Music Academy.

Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy came from the respected and wealthy Jewish family Mendelssohn. On his father's side, he was a grandson of the eminent philosopher Moses Mendelssohn. Mendelssohn himself was baptized as a protestant at the age of seven. He is considered one of the most important musicians of the Romantic. He enriched the international concert scene with his own compositions and the rediscovery of the works of Georg Friedrich Händel and Johann Sebastian Bach.

The "Elijah Oratorio" by Mendelssohn Bartholdy tells the ancient story of the Old Jewish Testament: The Prophet questions the gods of Baal and Asher, popular in Canaan, but a sign from heaven confirms the supremacy of mono-theism. During the Nazi regime, the performance of the oratorio was forbidden for anti-Semitic reasons.

Today, the "Elijah Oratorio" is one of the great works of European music culture and very popular due to its exciting stage drama and choral singing. The Bremen RathsChor maintains a long-standing tradition of cultural cooperation with musicians from Ukraine. Last year the choir was a guest in Odesa.
